Crime Response Team (CRT)

he Greenville Police Department Crime Response Team (CRT) is a specialized team of officers who work closely with neighborhoods, apartment complexes and anywhere patterns of crime occur. The team was established in June 2008 by Chief Wilfong with a mission of targeting street level crime and utilizing community policing strategies in order to make long term improvements in communities. The CRT is part of the department's Vice and Narcotics Unit and utilizes specialized equipment and tactics to combat criminal activity. Although team members typically wear uniforms and drive marked vehicles they sometimes wear plain clothes, work undercover and conduct various specialized operations in order to combat crime and drug problems.

One of the primary goals of the CRT is to work closely with neighborhood residents to help reduce and eliminate problems. The team employs a wide variety of problemventional law enforcement our communities. tactics in order to identify and eliminate criminal and nuisance issues in neighborhoods. CRT officers work with, for example, Code Enforcement, the Greenville Housing Authority, Zoning, Traffic Engineering, Public Works, property management companies, apartment managers, Probation and Parole and the court system in order to address the underlying causes of criminal and nuisance activity. Be On Lookout (BOLO)

ne of the most frequent crimes in the city is auto breaking. Auto break-ins or auto thefts seem to occur with greater frequency where large groups of cars are parked for extended periods of time in places such as shopping centers, colleges, sporting events, movie complexes, and large apartment communities, but it can also occur when parked in front of your residence. These types of crime can occur anytime ~ at random on different days of the week and times of the day, depending on the locations. By following some of the simple precautions in the following section, you can help minimize your chance of becoming a victim of these types of crime. Always remember, even if nothing is taken from your vehicle but it has been broken into, please report this to the police immediately so that we can be aware of what is going in your area.

Crime Prevention & Safety Tips

Officers in Action

Detective Reider was investigating eight autobreakings with various items taken, including GPS's, IPods' and handguns. After obtaining video from downtown cameras showing the same vehicle in the area of the separate crimes, Detective Reider was able to identify the owner of the suspect vehicle and make an arrest.

Upon further investigation Detective Reider determined that another suspect was involved. With these two arrests Detective Reider was able to link both suspects to all eight auto break-ins.

Pet Safety in the City

The purpose of the Animal Control Unit is to provide animal control and enforcement services to the City of Greenville with the goal of maintaining the public's safety and health regarding animals in the city as well as to ensure animals are treated in a humane manner. Also, in each monthly newsletter, I will provide safety tips for the month, especially on crimes that may be featured in the BOLO section of the newsletter. For example, this month's BOLO was on Auto Breaking and Auto Theft. To help minimize your chances of becoming a victim of this, follow these tips: Always roll up your windows and lock the car, even if it is parked in front of your home; Never leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked - Put them in the trunk out of sight; Always park in high-traffic, welllighted areas, when possible; and never leave personal identification documents, vehicle ownership title, or credit cards in your vehicle.
